Subject: Flood Resiliency Action Plan



Background/Discussion

This topic was last discussed at the <u>July 10, 2025 regular board meeting</u> where EOR presented the draft Flood Resiliency Action Plan report. The purpose of this agenda item is to discuss the draft action plan and distribution to/communication with our partners.

Proposed Process Overview

Here is a general outline of next steps. The Board can adjust the timeline however it may wish.

- July 10: Board reviews draft report
- July 24: Board accepts draft report and directs staff and engineers to distribute to partners
- August: Staff/engineers distribute plan, seek feedback, and discuss with partner staffs
- August/September: Board holds joint mtgs with Forest Lake and Wyoming city councils
- September/October: EOR makes revisions to the Action Plan per partner feedback
- November/December: Board accepts final report which would include any changes/adjustments requested by the Board and/or partners

Note that EOR's approved scope for this work has a not to exceed amount of \$41,727. The remaining balance on the scope is \$9,200 as of June 30th. This remaining balance is intended to cover EOR's attendance at one meeting with City of Forest Lake staff and one meeting with City of Wyoming staff. We may need to consider a scope and budget amendment if we require EOR's attendance at more meetings.



Partner Coordination

The Board may decide exactly how the District will distribute the plan and hold coordination meetings. Below are some suggestions by staff and methods that were discussed at previous meetings.

- General Distribution: Staff may email the draft action plan and solicit comments from the District's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), which includes staff members from a variety of partners such as municipalities, counties, soil & water conservation districts, and state agencies.
- **City of Forest Lake**: In addition to the TAC email, share the action plan with city staff/engineers and set up a staff-level meeting to review. Then ultimately set up a joint coordination meeting with the CLFLWD Board and City Council.
- **City of Wyoming**: In addition to the TAC email, share the action plan with city staff/engineers and set up a staff-level meeting to review. Then ultimately set up a joint coordination meeting with the CLFLWD Board and City Council.
- **City of Scandia**: Continue to provide updates at quarterly staff coordination meetings. Scandia's area of the District has a relatively lower flood risk compared to Forest Lake and Wyoming. The District's ongoing work will benefit flood resiliency in the eastern half of the District (e.g., Bone Lake South property acquisition and restoration), but data shows that the higher priority areas for flood resiliency implementation are in the western half of the District.
- Washington County: The District meets with our county commissioner around September/October each year to review our annual budget. This regular annual meeting may provide a good opportunity to discuss flood planning at a management level. Staff are in communication and have coordinated in the past regarding the county's All Hazard Mitigation Plan. The District must work with the counties to seek FEMA grant funding.
- **Chisago County**: Board member(s) may wish to set up a meeting with our county commissioner to review the annual budget and/or flood planning. Otherwise, staff have been in communication regarding the county's All Hazard Mitigation Plan and will coordinate regarding FEMA grant seeking, as applicable.
- Washington County Water Consortium: The water consortium is a collective of watershed, county, and SWCD staff that meets monthly. The topic of flood resiliency planning will be discussed at the September 3rd in-person water consortium meeting. Administrator Kinney is planning to attend. The District did not budget for consultants to attend. We estimate it would cost between \$500-\$800 for one EOR staff person to attend. The Board may direct staff to include EOR in this meeting, and fund the effort from the reserve, if desired.



Grant Seeking Considerations

Below is a summary of flood-related grants that the District may seek. District staff has reviewed this list with EOR. We recommend the District seek grants and develop projects after the final Action Plan is completed. Obtaining grants before undergoing initial project development can be risky because landowner cooperation may prohibit the District from being able to implement the project, thus leaving us unable to spend the grant.
