2. Budget Workshop

Manager Schmaltz and Planning Coordinator Emily Heinz presented a summary of potential budget options. The proposed plan included levy adjustments accounting for the average levy increase, lost funds due to delinquent taxes, and loan repayment.

In the past, the District's levy increase has typically been between 4 and 7 percent. Manager Schmaltz recommended the Board consider a levy increase of 20.8 percent for 2026, with smaller percentage increases planned for 2027 and 2028.

President Anderson questioned why feasibility costs are not completely covered by grants. Ms. Heinz explained that grants will not retroactively pay for costs that occurred before the grant funds were awarded. President Anderson requested a breakdown of awarded grants from 2024 and an estimation of how much of each project was covered by grant funding.

The Board discussed current expenses and projections, as well as other ideas to reduce spending. Manager Schmaltz asked to see comparisons to levies enacted by other

watershed districts. Ms. Heinz presented a table comparing the District's 2024 tax impact compared to other watershed districts in Washington County.

Manager Bakke said he calculated the 20 percent increase for his own property taxes, and found it represented about \$70. He also spoke to neighbors in the Bone Lake area about how they'd feel about a levy increase and heard that several neighbors were in favor of their money going towards local conservation causes. Ms. Heinz noted that the ad valorem levy will affect taxpayers differently depending on their property values. That is, if the District approves a 20 percent increase to the levy overall, it may not necessarily be a 20 percent increase for every resident. Some residents will see more than a 20 percent increase, while others may see less than a 20 percent increase.

President Anderson added that while a 20 percent increase may sound significant to taxpayers, the watershed levy represents a much smaller cost to property owners than city or school district taxes.

The Board discussed potential changes to the permitting fee structure to apply more permitting-related costs to permit holders rather than the District's general fund. The Board briefly questioned how the current budget would affect the District's plan to hire a business manager. Manager Bakke noted that the District is scheduling interviews for the position.

The Board has not yet set the date for the 2026 budget public hearing.
